
A NEIGHBORHOOD GENEALOGY OF YOUR OWN

How to create a neighborhood genealogy like TruxtonCircle.org




Determine your geographic boundaries

Start with where you believe your neighborhood's boundaries are now. If that is too large, pick a few blocks of interest.

Neighborhood boundaries change over time. If your neighborhood is in the old city boundaries, to stay consistent, keep the same city squares.

Within those boundaries you may notice great or slight changes with landmarks, streets, alleys and buildings coming, going or changing.




Maps

- •Start with the 1887 Hopkins Map in the Washingtonia Room at the Martin Luther King Library.
- •Look for your neighborhood in the front index.
- •Ask a librarian for help.

Look at Baist and Hopkins Maps to see changes over time





Once you have looked at the maps and determined your boundaries, you can tell which years with the US Census you need. If there were buildings and residences in 1887 in your study area, start with the 1880 census. If not, then begin with 1900.

Finding Census Information

- Find what enumeration districts ("ED") apply to your study area for that census. EDs change with each census.
- Find EDs with Stephen Morse's ED finder, using streets. See http://stevemorse.org/ census/index.html
- OR use census maps at the National Archives


Finding a census

Once you have the EDs, you can then look at census rolls.

- Find census microfilm at the National Archives, the Washingtonia room at the MLK Library, and many area research libraries.
- Find the census on-line at genealogy websites, like Ancestry.com and HeritageQuest.

Decide what you need from the Census

There are many and different questions the census asks and you may find it unnecessary to collect all the answers. So determine what you need.




Challenges

Difficult to read

Names and numbers can be hard to read. Look for the best and clearest copy.
